The Board of Elections is devised of a bipartisan staff of eighteen. Each employee works in a team to provide the utmost accuracy managing voter registration records and election results. An important aspect of managing accurate election results would be to appoint, schedule, and train our election inspectors.

We would like to introduce you to our team of Election Inspector Coordinators. Our Republican Coordinator is Joseph Joy. Joe joined the Board of Elections staff in 2012 and has been managing the Republican Election Inspectors for two election seasons. His Democratic counterpart is David Lawrence. David joined the staff in 2012. He is enthusiastic about his third election season.

The Board of Elections created two new positions in 2012 in accordance with a Consent Decree with the Federal Government to enhance bilingual outreach in communities throughout Orange County. This includes recruiting Bilingual Election Inspectors to be assigned at various locations to work on Election Day.

Our Democratic Bilingual Program Coordinator is Miriam Bauza. Miriam has been with the Board since 2010. Rose Shevchuk is our Republican Bilingual Program Coordinator and joined us in 2012.



The right to vote is one of our nation's oldest and most important entitlements, and with this right comes responsibility. Free and open elections are the basis on which this country was formed and you can make a difference by becoming a poll worker to help protect those freedoms. Our democratic process would not be possible without the commitment of these individuals.

Inspectors are needed in every part of Orange County. A minimum of 1500 election workers are needed each General Election.

The Board of Elections is committed to fulfilling its responsibility to the citizens of New York State by providing fair and accurate elections. This responsibility and the credit associated with it must be shared with the many dedicated workers that help make elections successful. You can get involved and become a proud participant in a process that is the foundation of democracy in our country. Election Inspectors are the eyes and ears of the Board of Elections. Inspectors are trained and empowered to ensure the procedures and the laws of New York State for all who enter a polling place.

What tasks will you perform as a poll worker?

- Arrive at assigned polling site at 5:15am
- Prepare the polling place for voting
- Set up the voting equipment
- Process the voters throughout election day
- Demonstrate voting procedures to the voters
- Assist voter if requested by the voter
- Close the polling place
- Canvass and report the results

Will you be paid?

Yes, by your Board of Elections. Orange County pays Election Inspectors \$200.00 for the day. Inspectors are also compensated for attending training. Machine Operators, Coordinators and Chairmen are also compensated additionally as they have added responsibilities.

When are you needed?

Just a few days a year: Primary Day in September, and Election Day in November.

Do I need Special Training to become an election worker?

Election workers are required by law to attend a training class each year and pass an exam. The training consists of three hour classroom and hands on training.

You are eligible to serve as a poll worker if you are:

- at least 18 years of age
- registered to vote in Orange County
- willing to work hours—5:15AM—9:30PM

Orange County is in need of Election Inspectors willing to work at various polling sites on Election Day. We are especially in need of poll inspectors who are proficient in both English and Spanish.

Bilingual Inspectors are needed in various locations throughout the County. These Inspectors are required to attend the same training as other Election Inspectors and have the same responsibilities but provide voter assistance to any voter who may only speak Spanish.
